Annual Report for 2022-2023

This past year has been a year of re-building: rebuilding from the effects of COVID on our volunteer and funding base, and re-building ourselves into a 100% volunteer facility as Hidden Valley no longer has a camp manager. In 2023, Friends of Hidden Valley, Inc. (FHV) has continued to do our best to support Hidden Valley camp's mission of supporting Girl Scout Programming and the FHV mission to provide support for the Hidden Valley Camp through gifts of time, money endowments and tangible items. We have also included our commitment to maintaining the property as environmentally accurate to the landscape that these 40 acres of green space were meant to be for generations of youth and others to learn and enjoy.

MONEY ENDOWMENTS AND TANGIBLE ITEMS

Our Fund Development Committee reorganized and made some assertive changes and grant applications. We changed our on-line donation portal to Zeffy, which is better described in the financial committee's report. **Three grant proposals have been written**:

Douglas County Cultural Heritage (which was not funded) and two other grants for funding from Kriz Charitable Foundation. One of these was turned down, two are pending, and more possibilities are being discussed. We also have an anonymous donor waiting to assist with these projects once we learn the outcome of our grant proposals. The funding committee wants to rebuild the Brookside Bridge and work on some environmental projects to augment our knowledge of flora and fauna at camp with inventories and wildlife cameras. The ultimate goal is to engage Girl Scouts and other youth and adults in this aspect of camp via an enhanced and more active website, and host an event at camp for Citizen Scientist for Girl Scouts working on Girl Scout Journeys.

GIFTS OF TIME

The Volunteer Committee has increased our commitment to upkeep at the camp in addition to our regular 3 Volunteer Days. This is described in detail in the Volunteer Committee Report.

COMMITMENT TO GIRL SCOUTS

The Recognition Committee continues to award Girl Scouts and Troops as well as our many valuable volunteers.

COMMUNITY AWARENESS

We have participated in events in town to bring awareness to Hidden Valley such as Earth Day, talks at local organizations and our newsletters which continue to get rave reviews from our membership.

Without the continued dedication of volunteers and donations, this green space could not be maintained. We are eternally grateful for everyone's contribution.

OVERVIEW

The Volunteer Committee organizes three official workdays/volunteer days (September, November, April) and reports on camp use by the Hiking Patrol (through Jill Giele), other camp walkers through the onsite and online registration (assisted by Nancy Jorn and Cris Bandle), Honeysuckle Warrior efforts (coordinated by Durand Reiber), Valley Gardeners (coordinated by Durand Reiber), and bluebird monitoring (by Jill Baringer). Like other Board members, we also assist with Trails Day in June as needed.


Below are maps of Hidden Valley showing the areas where work was done during the three Volunteer Days. As originally conceived by former camp manager Durand Reiber, the September workday focuses on the east-central part of the camp (cabin and surroundings), the November workday on the west-central part of the camp (Mary's Meadow and surroundings, and the April workday on the east side of the camp (entrance and Flagpole Hill vicinity).

Besides the project leaders, Scouts, other volunteer workers, and LHVC and FHV board members, we are also very grateful to the volunteers who provided first aid for the Volunteer Days (Mary Beth Petr and Margaret Townsend), and to the many who helped with refreshments.


Orange-brown boxes show areas worked.

For the September Volunteer Day, we had 58 volunteers doing a splendid job working in the "middle" of the camp. They comprised 3 Girls Scout Troops with 17 girls and 8 adults; 5 FHV Board members (including one new Board member); 8 members of Friends; 1 LHVC Board member who also brought her troop; 3 KU students and 3 local high school students earning service hours for National Honor Society, one with a parent; and 13 parents and students from Morning Star School.

Tasks accomplished included cleaning the cabin including the solar panels, weedwhacking foxtail along the road and parking lot where mowers cannot go, removing a wasp nest from the bell tower (!), Friends Memorial Garden and East Garden maintenance and tree mulching, weeding and sweeping the brick patio, cleaning the 3hole latrine and UACT (Universally Accessible Composting Toilet) including the solar panel, sweeping Southern Shade and trimming back encroaching branches and brush in the front and back yards of Arcalooka, sanding and staining the Leopold bench in Southern Shade, and restocking several woodpiles.

Pink boxes show areas worked.



This Volunteer Day was the largest, in terms of volunteers, and the coldest! There were 232 volunteers who accomplished a lot. The volunteers included 16 Girl Scouts with 11 registered adults, MANY volunteers from the Tri Delta sorority as well as other KU students, students from Lawrence High School Thespian Club and other high school students from both Free State and Lawrence High. Those groups totaled 188. There were 8 FHV Board Members, 2 LHVC Board Members and 7 FHV members attending. The areas addressed were Mary's Meadow, Zipline, Windmill, Wetland Pond, Sherwood Forest/archery range, Pollinator Garden, Dogwood Forest, the bridge at

Brookside, Yurt, and the natural areas in Dogwood Forest. Tasks completed include collecting and burning brush, sapling maintenance, garden maintenance (pollinator garden and bioswale), wetland and wetland kiosk maintenance, Wildlife Observation Blind renovation, bluebird box maintenance, fire ring renovation and maintenance, sanding Leopold benches (too cold to stain), marking the tools in the Dogshed with green tape for easier sorting from Evelyn Attic tools, trimming encroaching brush and tree branches, and sanitizing bluebird boxes.

There were 90 volunteers at the beautiful spring day that was the April Volunteer Day. These volunteers included Girl Scouts (26), adults accompanying GS troops (8), KU student volunteers (14), project leaders and project organizers (14), and community volunteers (28).


Tasks included cleaning Evelyn's Attic, cleaning the kiosk, tending gardens at Evelyn's Attic and the Sidewalk Gardens at Redbud Shelter, tending trails and especially clearing

the overgrown and neglected Stream Walk, renovating 11 fire rings (MB, RO, OG, MB, OO, CB, EF, LO, HS, LA, BG) and moving cut firewood, planting about 65 saplings, tending previously planted saplings, repairing footbridge near Redbud, removing unwanted growth along fence lines, picking up trash along fence lines and in creeks, removing sticks in mowed areas, and thoroughly cleaning Redbud Shelter.

CAMP USE

Below are graphs comparing this year's camp-use numbers to the past five years, with hikers tallied in the first graph and workday attendance in the one below. We are grateful for all the volunteers and hikers who help keep the camp in top shape! Remember that the April 2020 workday was cancelled because of the first COVID outbreak, and there was no differentiation between spontaneous hikers (using on-site registration) and hiking patrol. We had a record number of volunteers for the November 2022 Volunteer Day, and we had respectable numbers for September 2022 and April 2023.

We are so grateful for all the help in keeping the Camp in top shape! Forty acres is a big area to maintain, and each of our volunteers who observe and report or volunteer their time and skills in the endless maintenance work are shining stars!!



A difference this year (2022-2023) is that the Morningsong Forest School held K-9 school at the camp from September – May, at the same times the USD-497 schools met. So, the camp had a pretty high occupancy Monday-Friday, morning to early afternoon, for most of the year. I hope the school has not discouraged hikers from walking, but I am sure the students there are greatly benefiting from using the Camp.

Special Reports from the Volunteer Committee

Bluebird Report Jill Baringer, 16 July 2023

We had two successful nests built in two boxes at Hidden Valley this summer. The one on Flagpole Hill fledged 4 little bluebirds while the box in the middle of Mary's Meadow fledged 3 little ones. The experienced pair of adults has built a new nest in the Flagpole Hill location and over the past week the female has laid 5 white eggs, just like she did earlier in the season. One of the eggs in the first batch didn't hatch, likely sterile. I am betting this pair of birds are the same pair that attempted and succeeded with two batches of chicks last summer, as they remember success and will remain loyal to that location. I will repost how they fare in a few weeks.


Honeysuckle Warriors and Valley Gardeners

HONEYSUCKLE WARRIORS: We were very fortunate this year with new volunteers joining the fun. In all, 14 individuals, including the coordinator, (up from nine last year), contributed nearly 240 hours of hard physical labor during a total of 11 events. This represents 80 "people" days of site use by volunteers. There were seven long-term volunteers and a few new ones that came regularly, and seven others came occasionally. All are appreciated!!

One volunteer, Mike Huslig, in addition to working 20 hours at the Honeysuckle Warrior events, worked an additional 129.5 hours ridding Hidden Valley of invasive species including garlic mustard and mullein, as well as honeysuckle.

Below is a map showing the areas worked by the Honeysuckle Warriors in 2023 (lavender boxes):




VALLEY GARDENERS: The Valley Gardeners is a new volunteer group that began this summer to address maintenance and improvements of the various gardens of Hidden Valley. Although many of our native pollinator gardens are intended to be fairly wild and do not require the attention of a regular home garden, they do need yearly maintenance to remove the more aggressive and/or invasive or weeds and woody plants that can easily take over the desired pollinator plants.

Coordination of these events began later in the season than desired due to the coordinator needing to address family concerns. Only two events were scheduled prior to the onset of soaring heat. Two volunteers met on June 6th and three on June 8th to work on the pollinator gardens in the berm surrounding the wetland. They did extensive weeding followed by the laying of cardboard and newspaper in the cleared areas, which were then covered with seasoned hay for mulch. This process allows us to suppress the weeds for a season as we catch up to more routine maintenance.

Below is a map showing the gardens at HVC. Garden names are in green; gardens are designated by a daisy-like flower. (The Butterfly Memorial Garden marker includes the garden on the southeast side of the cabin and the Madison Smith Memorial at the northwest corner of the cabin). The gardens are tended by the Valley Gardeners and also at the Volunteer Days, people-power and time permitting, as follows:

- Valley Gardeners: Primarily the Butterfly Memorial Garden, Pollinator Garden, and Bioswale
- April Volunteer Day: Entry gardens, Evelyn's Attic garden, Redbud Sidewalk gardens, Butterfly Memorial Garden
- September Volunteer Day: Butterfly Memorial Garden
- November Volunteer Day: Pollinator Garden and Bioswale

These volunteers have been helping to keep Hidden Valley the beautifully memorable place it is. (See all these reports on our FHV website.)



Fundraising Committee Report for 2022-2023

The fundraising committee re-organized this spring. Key highlights: The committee will be meeting periodically this next fiscal year to set goals for the next 18-24 months. Goals will encompass a two-fold vision:

- Grant funding opportunities for specific projects to support the Hidden Valley Campsite and the goals set forth by the FHV incorporation vision.
- On-going funding opportunities or programs that would support on-going Friends of Hidden Valley activities within the vision set forth by FHV organization incorporation.

A committee member is gathering a resource list of grant funding possibilities. The hope is that grant opportunities will support several campsite projects under guidance of the Hidden Valley Committee. Some of these projects include Brookside Bridge repair, solar panels, trail-cameras, and funds to enhance our website to show the results from the trail-cams. The goal is to reach Girls Scouts in the environment of the 2020's, improving our use of the internet, etc. The process has begun and has already included possibilities such as Kriz Foundation and the Evergy Green Team.

OTHER NEWS:

AmazonSmile has generated \$650-\$950 each year for the past several years. This program was discontinued in March 2023. The fundraising committee will be exploring other possibilities including re-evaluating the cost of bricks for the Bricks-to-Bricks program.

We switched to a new on-line donation program which was installed in early summer. Our decision to transition from Just Giving to Zeffy, the new program, has saved us money we formerly spent in transaction fees for our valued members' donations.

Membership/Public Relations Committee Report for 2022-2023

Members continue to be the primary source of support for Friends of Hidden Valley. Their contributions of time, talent and funds provide the base of support needed for growth. There were 109 active members for the 2023 membership year, representing 146 individuals and including 16 Lifetime members.

There were three membership solicitation mailings, completed in November, February and June. The database of members continues to be updated at the conclusion of each membership year. Increased use of digital communication will continue to reduce expenses of traditional mailing.
